Pre-AP and AP Courses

Varied offerings and an 8-period schedule allow students to take eight classes per semester. English, mathematics, science, and social studies courses are offered on three levels: Regular, Pre-AP or Honors and AP.

Dual Credit

Students have the opportunity to take dual credit courses through South Plains College and The University of Texas at Austin OnRamps. Students have the opportunity to earn college credit through South Plains College in English Composition I and II (ENGL1301/1302), Statistical Methods (MATH 1342), Federal Government (GOVT 2305), Microeconomics (ECON 2302) U.S. History I (HIST 1301, 1302), Beginning Spanish II (SPAN 1412), Inter Spanish I/II (SPAN 2311-2312, Beginning German (GERM 1412), Integrated Software Application (ITC 1309), Firefighter Certification-Fall (FIRS 1301, FIRS 1407, FIRS 1313, FIRS 1319), Firefighter Certification-Spring (FIRS 1323, FIRS 1329, FIRS 1433, FIRS1203-Firefighter Agility and Fitness prep), Accounting 1 (ACNT 1303), Accounting 2 (ACNT 1304), EMT Basic (EMSP 1401) and Engineering Graphics (ENGR 1304). Students have the opportunity to earn college credit through UT OnRamps in Biology (BIO 311C + BIO 206LA), Chemistry (CHEM 1301), Geoscience and Physics (PHYS 1301).

Endorsement

Students are required as part of their elective classes to complete a coherent sequence of electives in one area as part of their graduation requirements.

State Required Testing

Students must also pass the STAAR—State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness, or End of Course exams. The five areas that must be mastered include: English I, English II, Biology, Algebra I, and United States History. The students take the End of Course exam(s) the school year in which they complete the course.

Grading Scale

CHS is on a weighted 4.0 scale. The overall average must be a 70 or above to receive credit.

Average Pass: Students who fail the first semester of a year-long class receive credit for that semester if their average for the year is a 70 or above.

GPA and Rank

The grade point average (GPA) is determined by using semester grade averages as reflected on a student's transcript. All courses are included in the GPA. The official class ranking is calculated at the end of the 5th six weeks of the student's senior year.
